Question 1: *How is my district/charter prioritizing the students and families furthest from opportunity in the establishment of equity councils?*

Question 2: *How do we establish an equity council that is set up to succeed in advising the district or charter school on budget, services, and programs?*

Question 3: *How do we establish an equity council that moves the district or charter school beyond compliance to commitment?*

Question 4: *How do I support the establishment of structures and systems to ensure effective relationship and partnership between all stakeholders on the equity council?*

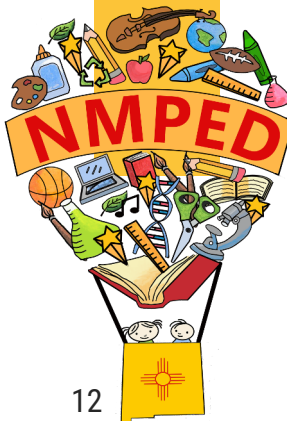
“For high-level requests from the Public Education Department, we always first inform our school board.” “Then, we emailed all building principals and asked them to nominate an individual who met at least one of the criteria mandated in the PED’s memo. We also reached out to external organizations, including the Chamber of Commerce, Hispano Chamber of Commerce and NAACP to ask for candidates.” -TJ Parks, Superintendent, Hobbs Municipal Schools

“As soon as we learned of the PED’s equity council mandate, we sent out a phone blast to parents and local community stakeholders. We also informed our stakeholders via social media. 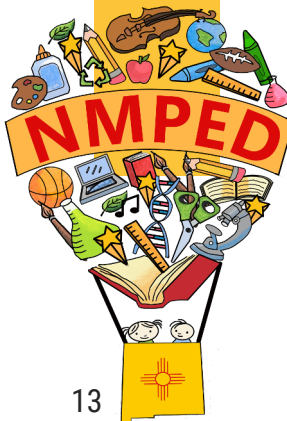

Coordinates tasks, scheduling, meeting logistics, content development, statewide communications, gather and monitor progress, challenges and innovations.



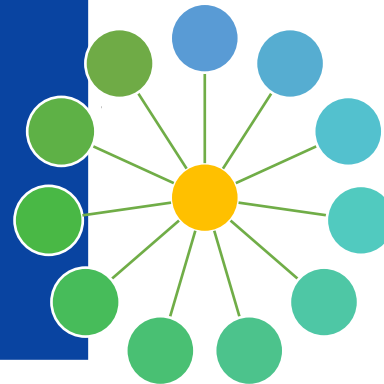
Equity Facilitator

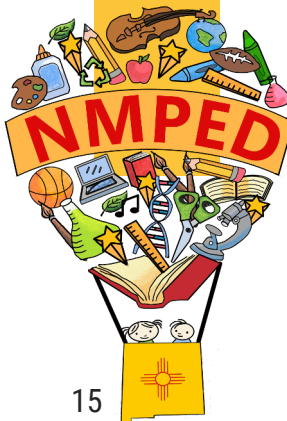

Students in Centering Equity

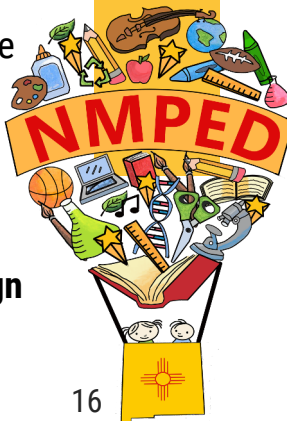

"I feel equality in the classrooms means allowing everybody to understand themselves, understand their perspective and version of the world, and to be allowed to share who they are and where they come from in a safe learning environment. We need to see ourselves reflected back, honored, and recognized as students of color in our schools. Our schools should go above and beyond to connect to the communities that students come from. I feel especially that mental health services need to be funded and more normalized in our school settings. Young people should feel comfortable accessing a counselor, and there needs to be more funding for mental health services for our kids. I do feel like much has improved for Queer youth in the schools, but I would like to see more Queer role models and histories in our textbooks."

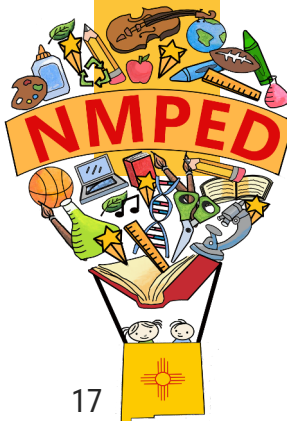
"We need more life skills in our classroom. This is how we can truly succeed in life after we graduate high school. Lots of times brown kids who come from low-income backgrounds don't have the same privileges that students with money do. Lots of times we go to schools that aren't located in the "rich" neighborhoods. This means that all schools need to be funded better. This means we need to help our brown students acquire the skills to thrive after high school so we can work at overcoming the struggles of poverty and make something of ourselves. During my junior year, I had to sit on the floor near a trash can for a week because my Science class was overpopulated and there were no extra desks or chairs. Four of us had to sit on the floor and try to take notes and listen to the teacher. This is not fair and this is not equity."

Breakout Room Instructions

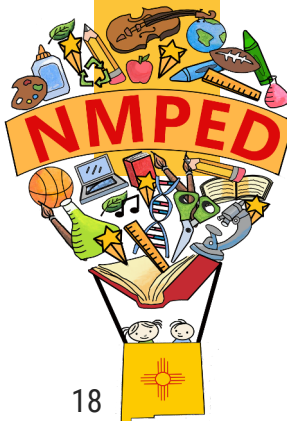
- You will spend 30 Minutes with your Equity Facilitator.

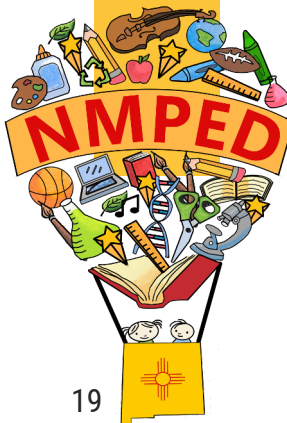

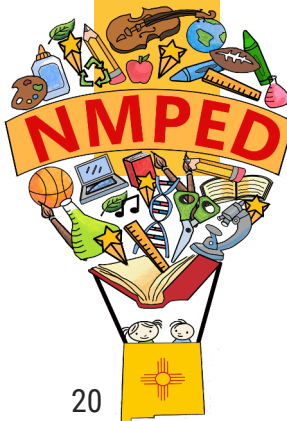

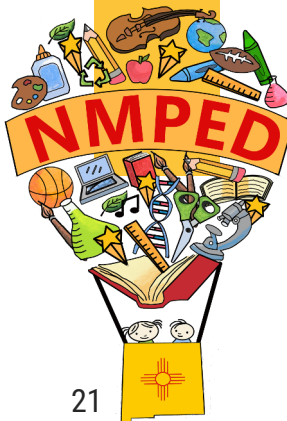


Student Focus: Equity Council Participation

For true equity in the schools, I think adults need to listen to the voice of young students. A whole lot more! There is a disconnect between what adults want to hear, how they want to help us, and not remembering that youth perspective is necessary in creating equity in our schools. It is highly important to include young people in the conversation. Also, Native kids need to be able to practice their culture, speak their language, learn their language, and learn real history about what our ancestors endured. If I need to attend a cultural dance or a feast with my community I want to without being penalized by a teacher or principal. I want to be able to fully express all of me in the classroom and at my school. I am able to at my current high school but this is not the way it is for so many Indigenous kids across New Mexico.

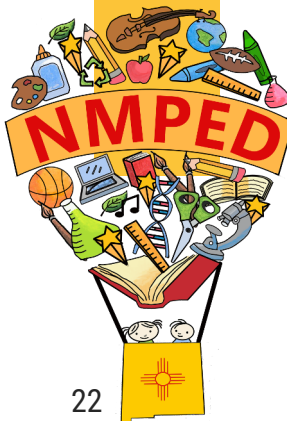

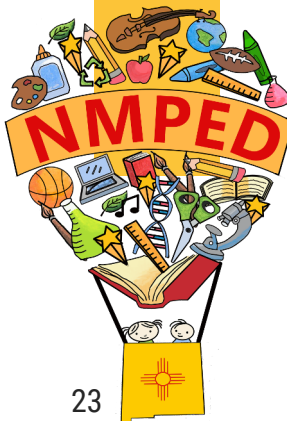
- Culturally and Linguistically Responsive Frameworks: Schooling by design that allows for adjustments to systems to ensure all students are grounded in their community values, healthy, secure in their identity, and holistically prepared for college, career and life.
- Co-creation: We should hold community and institution together in spaces, and shift power to students and families. This requires intentionality so that we provide space for students and families in our decision-making.



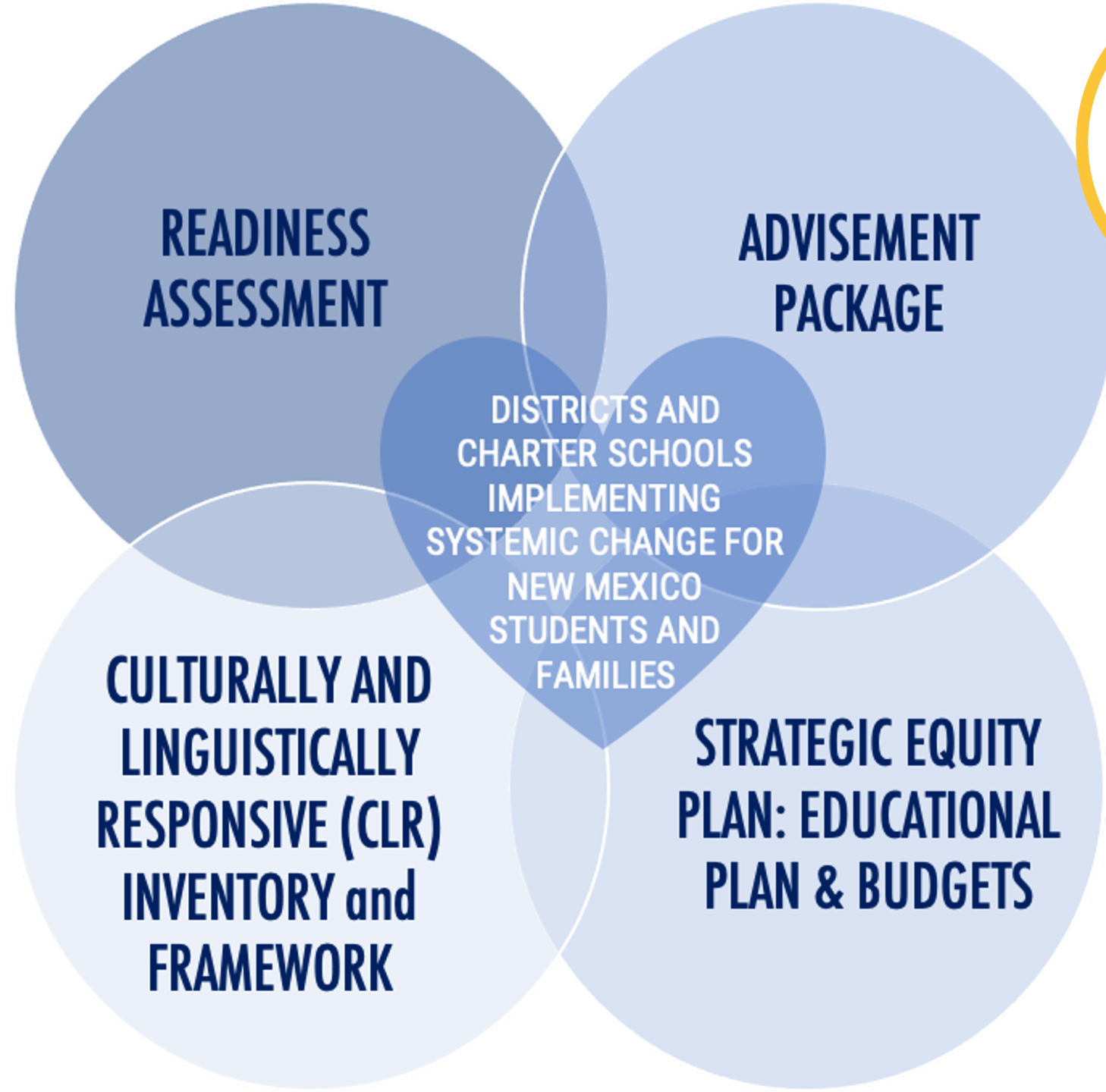
Hand to Heart: Closing

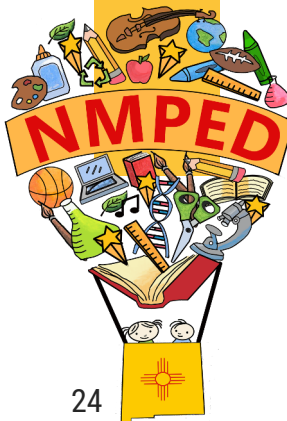
